FROM THE RECTORY DESK

Dear Friends,

Godly inspiration is what we seek from our six Lenten Poems. The first from Thomas Hardy is included in this edition of the SS. I would recommend reading the



poem through quickly at first and then more reflectively, noting anything that jumps out to you that may have a religious or spiritual meaning. The idea is to get a sense of what the poem means to you. The following questions may be helpful.

What is the poem about? What clues are in the title?

How is it written sometimes known as the genre: ballad, elegy, sonnet, ode etc. Any figures of speech that give it away e.g., metaphor, repetition, personification, simile, alliteration etc.

Are there any underlining political, social, philosophical, or religious ideas evident in the poem?

Is there a sense of spiritual continuity in the lines of the poem or just the occasional reference?

What is the mood of the poem? Bathos, pathos, comedy, mysterious, hopeful etc. Typically, the poems of RS Thomas lean towards darkness, even melancholy, whereas those of Chaucer are often riddled with satire.

Does the poem say anything to you about Lent?

What kind of God is represented in the wording of the poem?

What can we learn about the poem from the life of the writer? a little google assistance could help here.

These are just a few ways we can begin to challenge the poem and try to form a view on what we are reading. Remember there are no right or wrong interpretations just yours and mine. Finally, commit your findings to God in prayer. I Look forward to discussing your thoughts on Zoom that we may grow together on our Lenten journey.
