FROM THE RECTORY DESK

Dear Friends,

Easter is celebrated on the last day in March this year but the holy season known as Passiontide



beginning on Palm Sunday will bring into focus different events in the life of Christ in his final days on the Earth. Telling the story of some of those events is captured in "The Stations of the Cross". This is a spiritual and physical journey that walks with Christ through the stages of his arrest, judgment, crucifixion, and resurrection.

You may be familiar with the person of Saint Francis of Assisi who gave us the Nativity story complete with animals and the crib, but few connect Saint Francis and his order of Franciscans with "The Stations of the Cross". They began by creating outdoor shrines in Europe to replicate the places along the Via Dolorosa where Christ journeyed carrying his cross to Golgotha, a place of execution just outside the city of Jerusalem.

In 1686 pope Innocent 11th granted to the order of Franciscans the right to erect stations or places for Easter reflection in their churches. There are 15 stations in all and each station has an accompanying biblical narrative, prayer and reflection.

Most people who travel the stations are deeply moved and inspired and better prepared for the joy of Easter through the experience of walking THE WAY. At the Sands every Good Friday we host a "Stations of the Cross" pilgrimage, it is very popular with local pilgrims, children and dogs escort us in the procession. You are welcome to join us for the two-kilometre walk, to enjoy community fellowship and a hot cross bun after at the Sands church.

May the joy of the resurrection fill your hearts with hope and peace.

NATIONAL CHURCH NEWS

More than £250,000 was distributed by the Church of England last year to support conservation projects in parishes, including work to preserve wall paintings, baptismal fonts, stained glass windows and rood screens.

A <u>total of £255,585</u> has been awarded for 123 projects in 34 dioceses – with the number of grants up 20% on the year before - to help churches maintain and preserve significant cultural and historical items, including paintings, doors, chairs, clocks, and organs.


The grants, from donated funds, including major funder, the Pilgrim Trust, were distributed by the Church of England's national Cathedrals and church buildings team, alongside ongoing advice and guidance.

Emily Gee, Director of Cathedrals and Church Buildings for the Church of England, said: "Many of these special features that have been conserved have been cherished over generations and remain deeply significant to their local communities, as well as of being of national historic interest. These remarkable wall paintings, stained glass, clocks, bells, furnishings and monuments are carefully maintained and looked after by teams of dedicated volunteers in church congregations.

"Most projects will have been advised by our national Cathedral and Church Buildings team, and some will have been visited. We remain on hand to provide advice and guidance to these parish churches.

"We are delighted that we were able to increase the number of grants by 20%, as well as the coverage across England. With the help of our respected and much appreciated funders we were able to fund 123 conservation projects across 34 of the 42 dioceses."


FEBRUARY CROSSWORD SOLUTION



SAINTS IN FOCUS

Thomas Cranmer (489 –1556) was a leader of the English Reformation and Archbishop of Canterbury during the reigns of Henry VIII, Edward VI and, for a short time, Mary I. He helped build the case for the annulment of Henry's marriage to Catherine of Aragon, which was one of the causes of the separation of the English Church from union with the Holy See. Along with Thomas Cromwell, he supported the principle of royal supremacy, in which the king was considered sovereign over the Church within his realm.

During Cranmer's tenure as Archbishop of Canterbury, he was responsible for establishing the first doctrinal and liturgical structures of the reformed Church of England. Under Henry's rule, Cranmer did not make many radical

changes in the Church, due to power struggles between religious conservatives and reformers. He published the first officially authorised <u>vernacular</u> service, the <u>Exhortation and Litany</u>.

When Edward came to the throne, Cranmer was able to promote major reforms. He wrote and compiled the first two editions of the <u>Book of Common Prayer</u>, a complete liturgy for the English Church. With the assistance of several <u>Continental reformers</u> to whom he gave refuge, he changed doctrine or discipline in areas such as the <u>Eucharist</u>, <u>clerical celibacy</u>, the role of <u>images</u> in places of worship, and the <u>veneration</u> of saints. Cranmer <u>promulgated</u> the new doctrines through the prayer book, the <u>Homilies</u> and other publications.

After the accession of the <u>Catholic</u> Mary I, Cranmer was put on trial for treason and <u>heresy</u>. Imprisoned for over two years and under pressure from Church authorities, he made several <u>recantations</u> and apparently reconciled himself with the Catholic Church. While this would have normally absolved him, Mary wanted him executed, and he was <u>burned at the stake</u> on 21 March 1556; on the day of his execution, he withdrew his recantations, to die a <u>heretic</u> to Catholics and a <u>martyr</u> for the principles of the English Reformation. Cranmer's death was immortalised in <u>Foxe's Book of Martyrs</u> and his legacy lives on within the Church of England through the <u>Book of Common Prayer</u> and the <u>Thirty-Nine Articles</u>,
